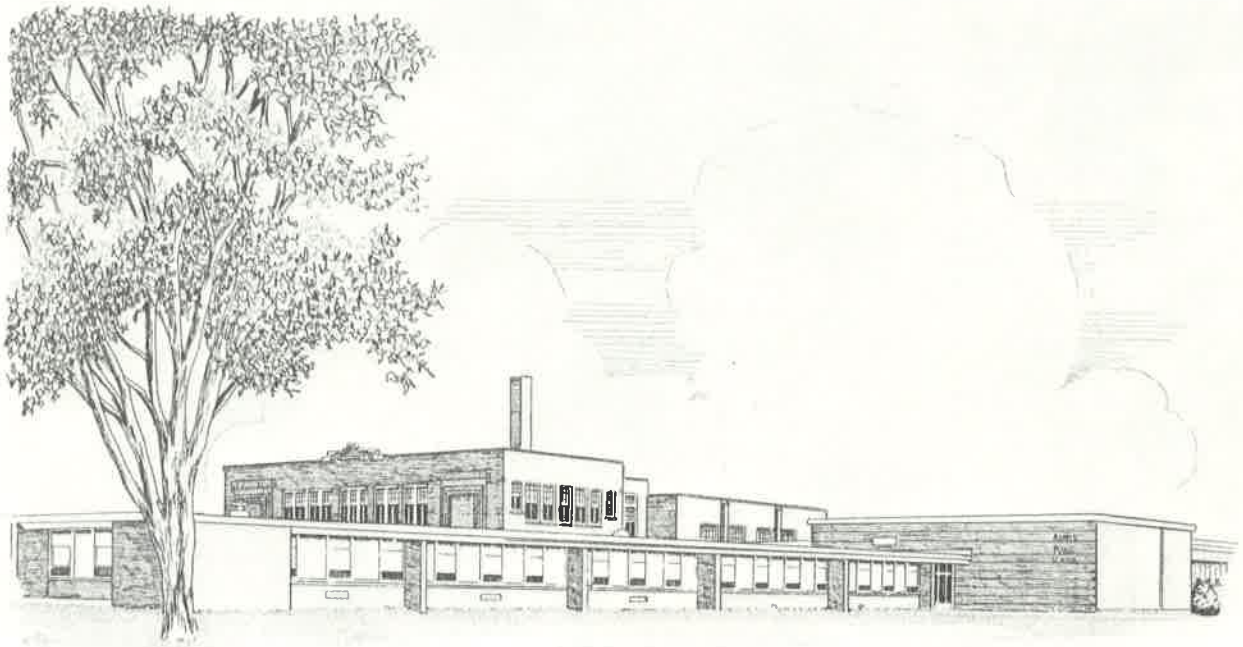

By Royalty And Floats



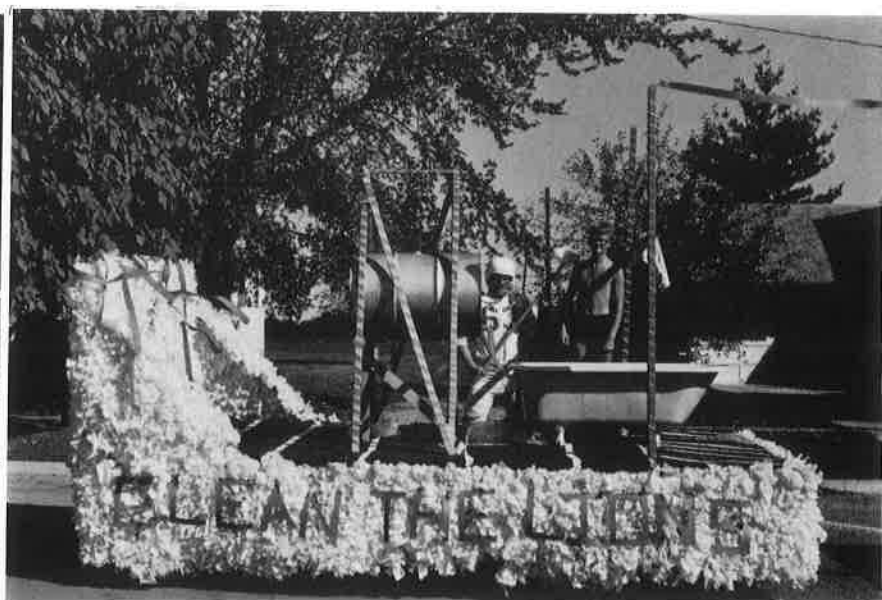

Adams Varsity Football Squad



Ripping through their last three opponents, Elkton, Pine Island, and Glenville, outscoring them 130-12, the Adams High School football team turned a slow, disappointing start into a roaring finish. The team acquired the confidence and experience they needed to turn themselves into a powerful unit, both defensively and offensively. Finishing fourth in the Southland Conference with a 3-3 record, 4-4 overall, the Tigers gave every indication of being the team to beat in the next few years. Despite being plagued by disabling injuries throughout the entire season, the team was able to provide the opposition with very stiff competition every week. Part of the credit for this must be directed towards the co-captains, John Goergen and Dave Krebsbach, who provided the team with fine leadership. Rapidly developing underclassmen helped bolster the attack. High scorer for the Tigers was sophomore Larry Voigt, who scored 66 points. Co-captain John Goergen was the leading pass catcher with nine receptions, the leading rusher with over 500 yards, and had the best average gain per carry with a 4.9 yard average. Rich Wolff, junior middle linebacker, paced the squad on defense, gaining all-conference honors at his position for the second straight year. John Goergen also received all-conference honors for his performance as a defensive halfback. The Tigers finished the season markedly improved, and indications are that next year's team will continue to progress from the point which the 1967 Tigers achieved.

End Season On A High Note

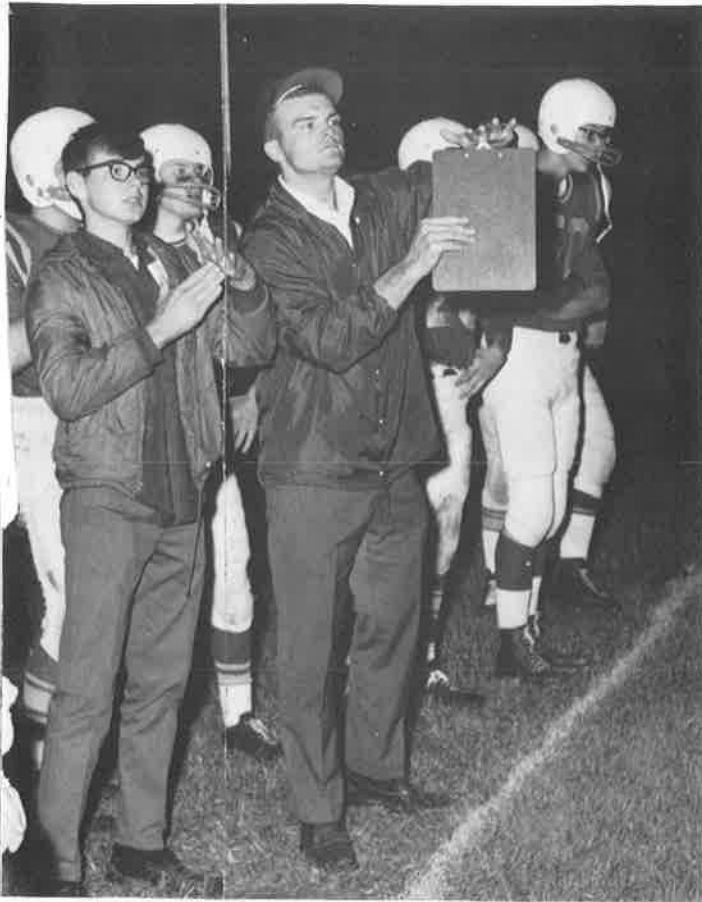

Slashing runs, crunching open field blocks, perfectly-thrown touchdown passes, and beautifully executed trick plays usually impress the crowds of spectators who witness football games more than anything else. Anyone with a knowledge of football will notice that each of these maneuvers is offensive in nature. It is easily understandable why the crowds are more interested in offensive displays because they tend to be more spectacular. To most fans and some coaches, the only way to win a football game is to have a better offense than the opponents. Most coaches, however, agree that the most important objective in a game is to stop the opponent and keep him from scoring. If the other team can't score, it can't win. This is where the defense is the most important.

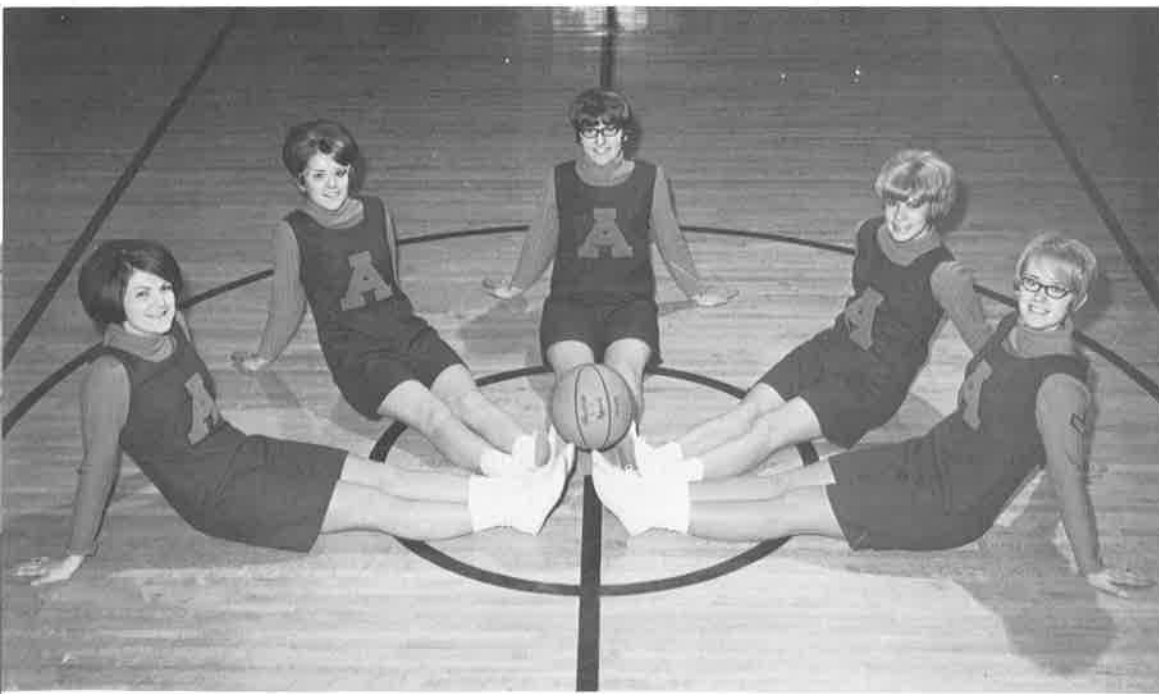
Coach Nordquist claims, "If a strong offense were to play against an equally strong defense at the end of a football season, the defense would usually come out on top!"

There is much more to defense than merely tackling the ball carrier or batting down an opponent's pass attempt. Every game will see a defensive team have several scoring opportunities. Being prepared will give the defense a distinct advantage over their opponents.

Headlines usually go to the offense, but it is the defense which enables the offense to get the ball and score. An offense can't possibly win a game by it-self. Football squads with overpowering offenses and poor defenses won't win many football games, and statistics bear this fact out.

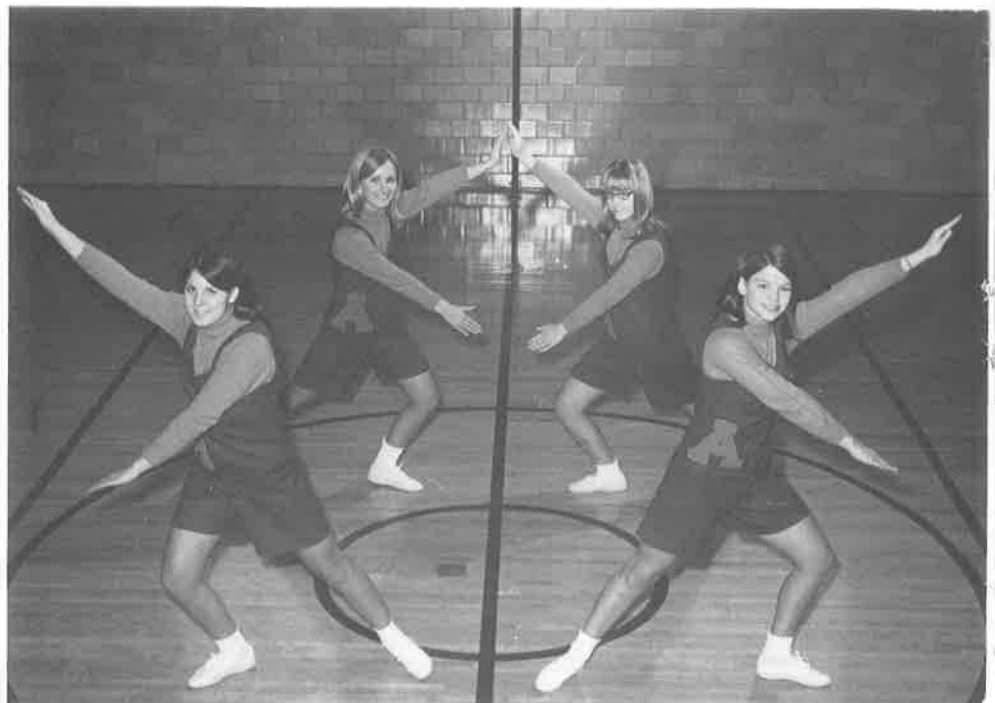
Cheerleaders Awaken School Spirit For Tigers

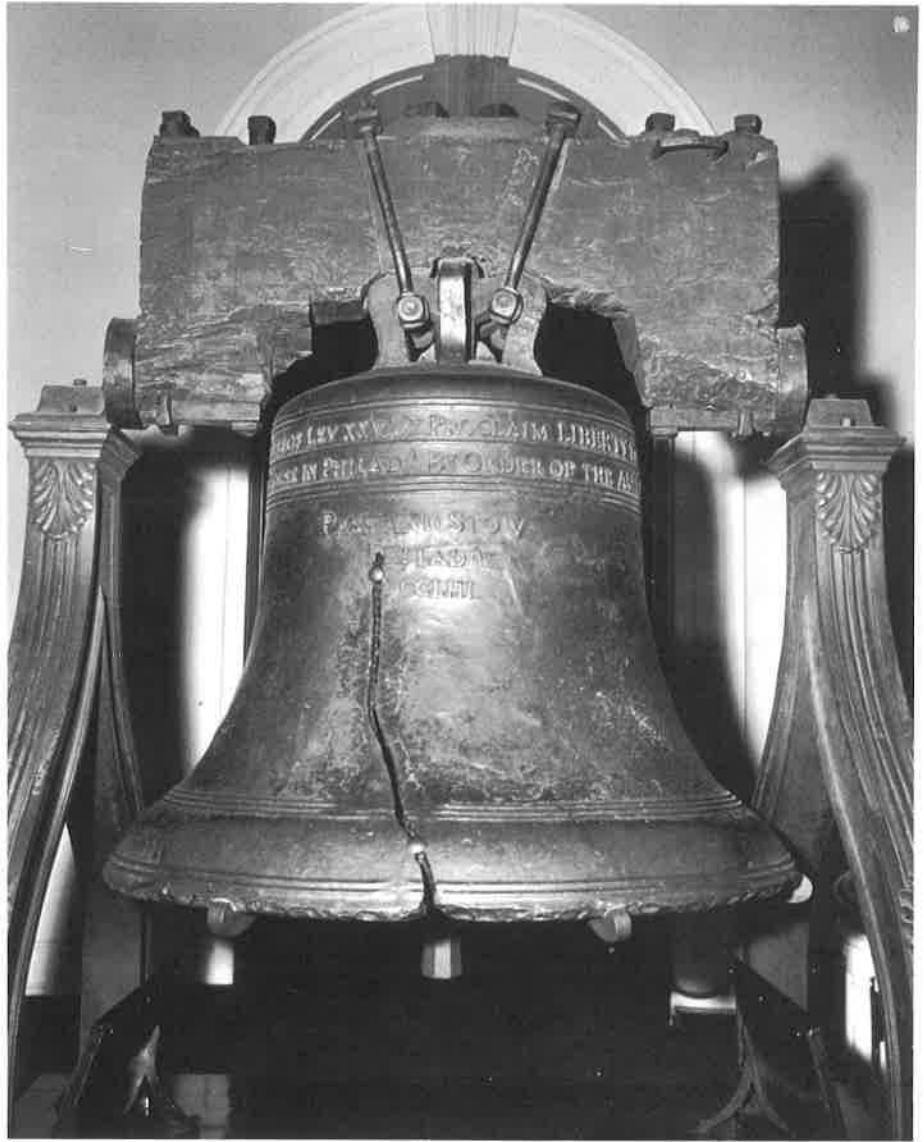

The Chorus has been under the direction of Mrs. Libby.



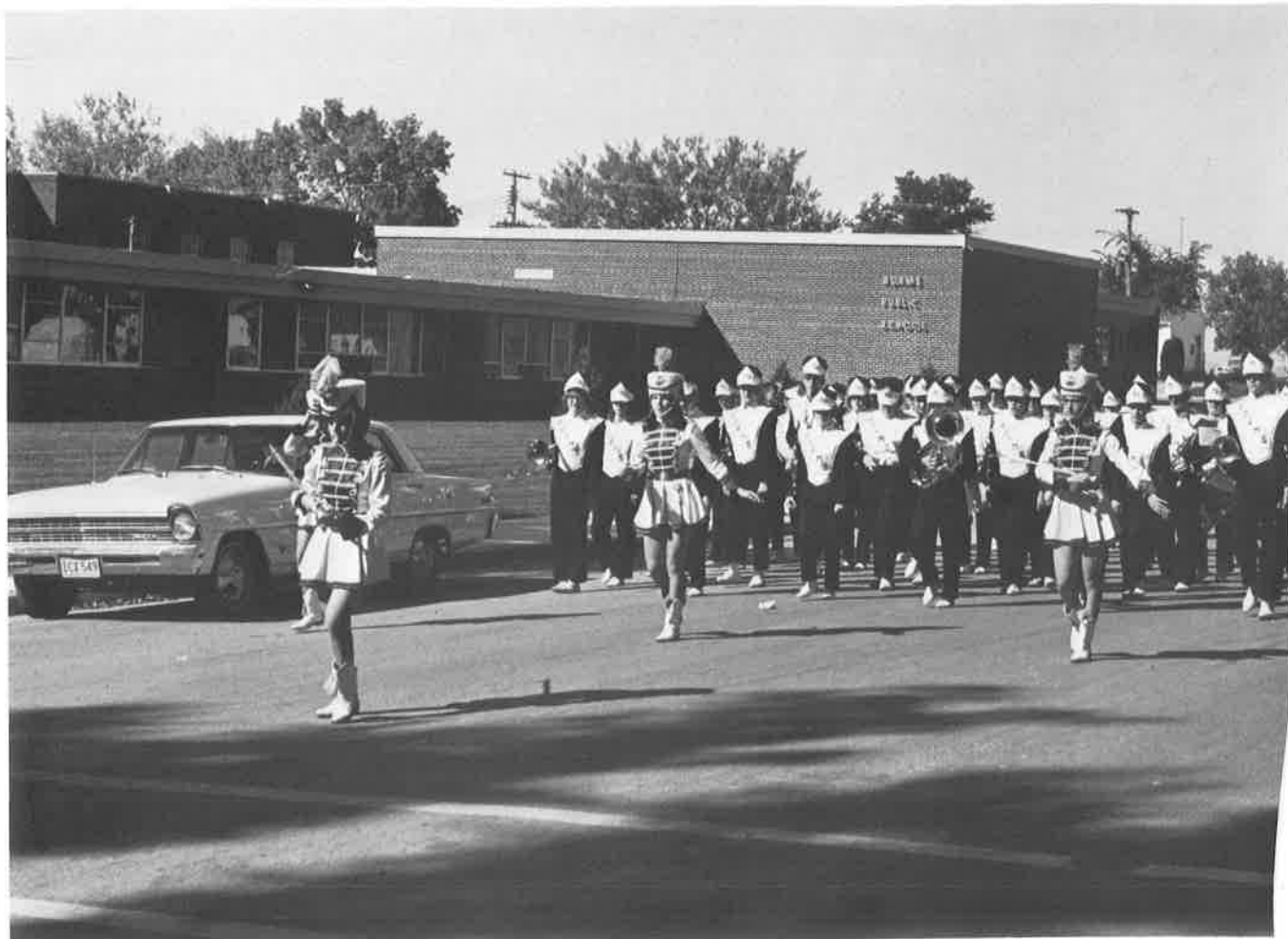
Strike Up The Band!

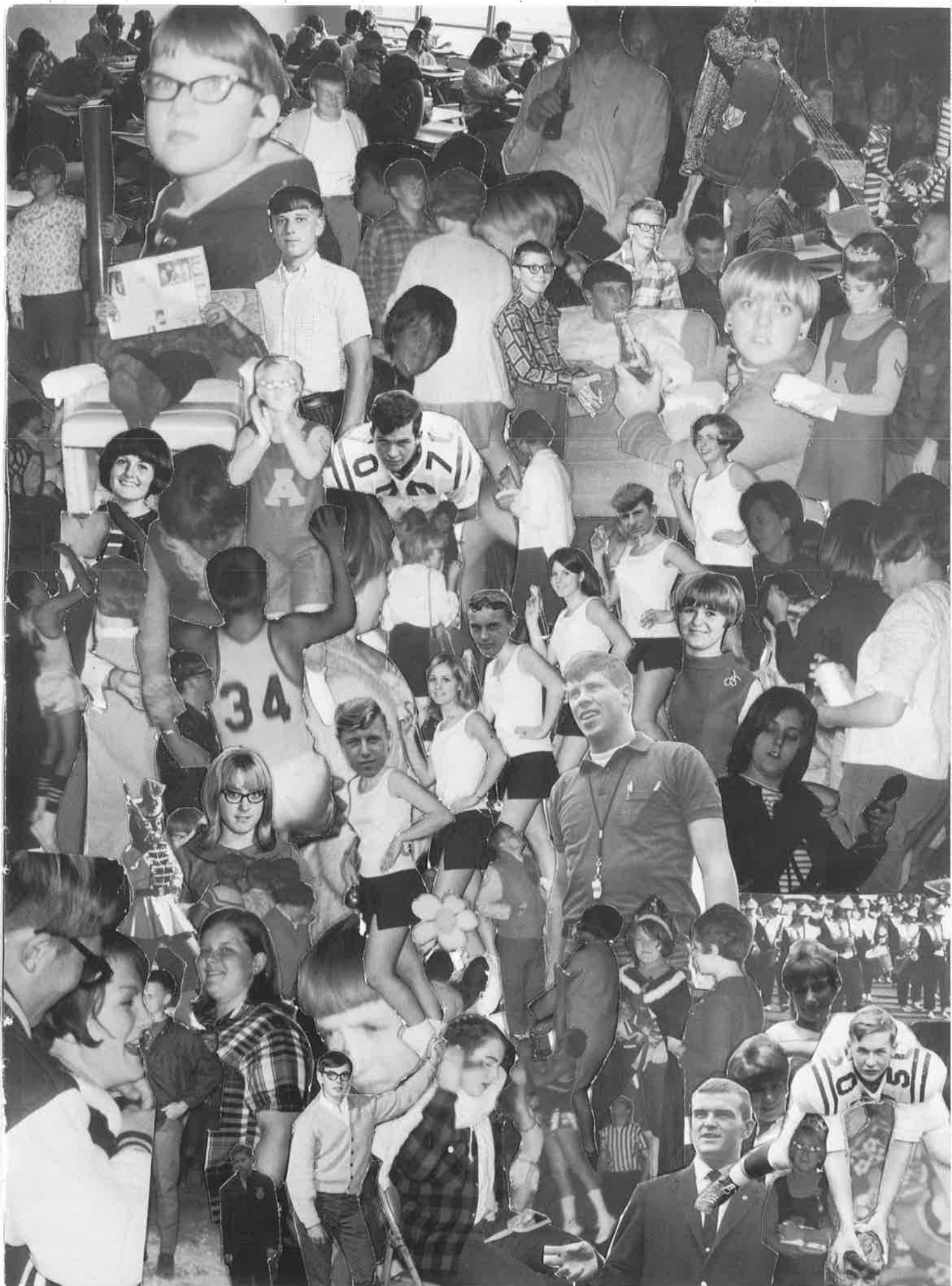

In developing our knowledge and skills necessary for today's technical world, we find our Math and Science Department among the most vital.



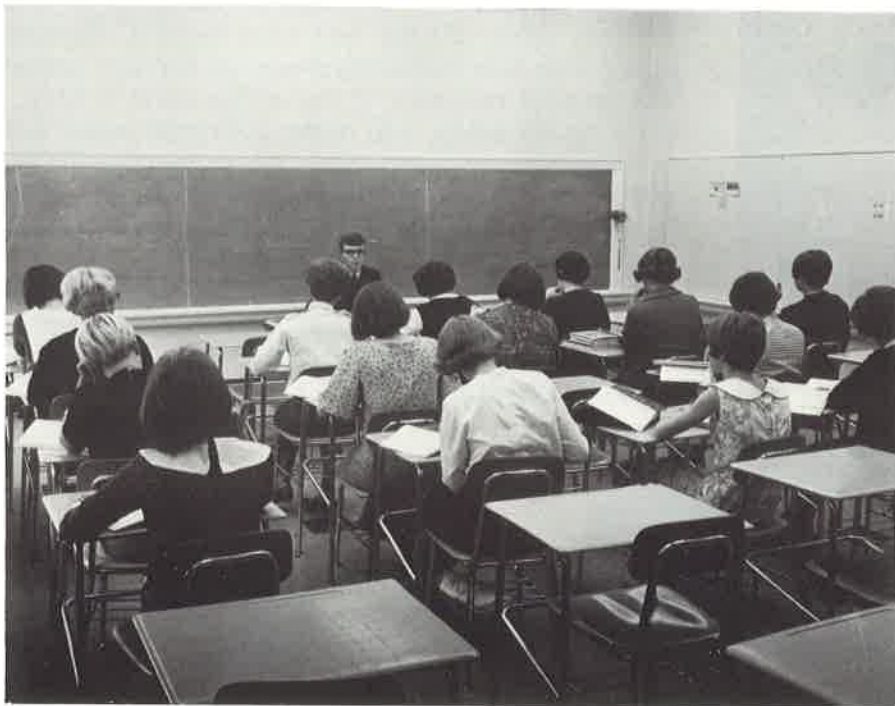
